

Every year thousands of people are incarcerated here in Illinois. Many of those Individuals In Custody (IIC) have some years to do, some of those, like myself, have many years to do. At the young age of 19 years I was arrested and charged with murder, I pled guilty and received 29 years at (100%) in IDOC. The day of my sentencing I was lucky enough to have a C/O who recognized that I was going through something internally and asked if I wanted to be out in a bullpen by myself so that I had time to myself and process what just happened. For those of us who went to the Bridgeview Court House we know that if you miss that first bus the second bus doesn't come for hours. That was the case with me so I had 3 hours in that bullpen and I went through a wide range of emotions from anger, resentment, and sadness.

Those 3 hours were the start of me deciding to change and make something of myself, yes, I have to do 29 years but I get to see my out date and something good had to come from this. I must atone for what I did and the only way I can do that is by becoming a better man. Now I'm not saying that I didn't make mistakes since that day because I have but I have also done good things. I was able to take Lifestyle Redirection, which was a great 3 month class. I was hospice certified in Dixon CC and that is the most humbling experience that I have ever had. When you are on a death vigil for someone who is dying from cancer it really put life into perspective! In 2019 I received my Associate Degree (ALS). There are other things that I've done but those are my proudest. I'm not saying this to toot my own horn but to ask you what have you done with your time? Many IIC waste valuable time while we are here and go

home with nothing done. There should be no excuses for this. Find something to do, get a job in the kitchen and work your way up to cook, this gives you valuable experience in the commercial cooking world. Work in the maintenance department, this also gives you experience in carpentry, painting, electrician, and welding. Take a vocational class-There are places you can contact for free books that you can read and learn a trade. Our outdates are not and should not be excuses. I get out on 9/19/2030 and the only reason I'm not taking any more academic classes is because I'm not allowed to anymore since I've earned my A.L.S, but I'm blessed enough to work in Industries where I'm being trained to be an upholsterer. Let's not waste this time! Do something productive, set yourself up for success here and now for when you get out. So I ask again what have you done with your time?

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RESIDECT

Back in the late 1960's, when the feminist movement was hitting its stride, Aretha Frank-lin released a hit record entitled "R-E-S-P-E-C-T," which clearly sent the message that all women were asking for was a little respect when they got home. Respect is what woman needed, and they "had to have it."

"R-E-S-P-E-C-T" became something of a theme song for many women, but what most of them did not realize (which I hope now you will realize) is that the song was really written by a man—Otis Redding—two years before Aretha ever sang it. Otis released the song as a single on August 15, 1965, as his message to his wife. Does the irony on this strike you as it does me? Aretha had the right to sing "R-E-S-P-E-C-T" from a female point of view, of course. A woman does need respect, and if a man loves her properly, she will get that respect. But, the primary meaning in Otis Redding's song is a cry from a man's deepest soul that says respect is what he needs and he's "got to have it." They are out to make money, so they produce what sells.

Knowing that, I challenge you to find a card from a husband to a wife that says, "Baby, I really respect you." You won't see it. That card isn't out there because that is not what a wife wants to hear. Women are locked into love. Love is their mother tongue. I'm not criticizing

that; I'm just pointing out a fact. In fact, if love weren't the woman's deepest value, this world would be in worse shape than what it is now. Women are this way and men rejoice.

Unfortunately, by the same token, you won't find any greeting cards that wives send their husbands saying, "Baby, I really respect you." Why not? That's because they don't sell either. When women buy greeting cards for their husbands, they want to express love for them; they don't even think about respect. Sadly, the deepest yearning of husbands goes unmet because wives (and the card publishers) are locked into relaying sentiments of love.

I did an informal prison survey here at Lawrence and asked 20 men if they were forced to choose, would they prefer being alone and unloved in the world.

For these men, the greater negative experience for them to endure would be to feel inadequate and disrespected by everyone.

These men are not saying that they are indifferent to love. They know they need love (just like LL Cool J needs love), but they need to feel respected even more than to feel loved. Personally, I would rather live with a wife who respected me but did not love me than live with a wife who loved me but did not respect me.

Perhaps a good analogy is water and food. We need both to survive, but we can live longer without food than without water. For men, love is like food and respect is like water. Enough said! Respect is the key to motivating a husband.






MY KEWANEE EXPERIENCE

I have served over two decades, and those of you who have been part of this journey can attest to the value of my spoken words. This has been a truly humbling, therapeutic, also affirming experience to put it mildly.



That was the greatest and the most powerful feeling because I had a voice and a positive platform, and Kewanee LSRC made that possible.

I would like at this time thank Warden Carothers also Lt. DeCoster for presenting me the opportunity to be part of the welcoming committee, however the work had been done before I ever penned my essay to be a part of the Kewanee community. It all began in the classrooms also the groups presented to me at Hill Corr. Center assisted by the men who stood shoulder to shoulder with me wanting nothing more than to better the individuals in custody we encountered every day along with the Clinical Services Staff who also stood with us. The



Kewanee LSRC staff also stands with those who they encounter daily, as you proceed to pass in the halls, greeted by name and a smile.

Finding the words to express all the emotions that flooded me to the new arrivals was a task, so I simply told them to just breathe and take it all in.

Because this community can be a lot to handle at one time, what you witness weekly or monthly on your tablet is exactly what you get 10 to 100 times over according to you and your expectations. You see my Kewanee LSRC experience is exactly what I have chosen to make it; all the opportunities are there, whether I take full advantage of them is entirely up to me. That is all any individual in custody can ask for, the chance to do better, be better men for ourselves, our community, our families. Now I want to share with you the Kewanee experience that by far exceeds most imaginations being that it was a life changing also an eye opening, training exercise. I was chosen, and vetted, to be a member of CMMP (Creditable Messenger Mentoring Program) and it is required by the D.J.J to be trained in conflict resolution also to be a Peace -Circle Keeper. I must say honestly for being an Individual in Custody for over 2 decades, I have never ever felt freer, after this experience.

Mentally, spiritually also physically free, the circle held and kept me, for the 4 days of training, and I left with a totally new outlook on this life and an attitude of gratitude towards this life and the situations and circumstances within it. This training and the things shared within it are confidential, and must never be spoken outside of it, however I can say in all honesty IDOC should really consider this training for all staff as well as Individuals in Custody as part of the orientation process as they enter the facilities. That would truly encourage the Individuals in Custody to consider serving a meaningful term of incarceration and that would give the future staff members the tools needed for a smoother transition from civilian life to Officer. My Kewanee experience continues as I continue to grow and take advantage of the many opportunities, which are before me here at Kewanee LSRC. Thanking you for your time.


My name is Stinson "Trey" Caldwell, and I'm here to tell you about my experience here at Kewanee.

During Orientation, the Warden came in and apologized for not being there to greet us upon walking in the Center, Due to it was Valentine's Day, after giving his speech and welcoming





each and everyone us, he walked around the room looked each and everyone of us in the eyes, while shaking our hands one by one (What Warden you know does that?)

Being here at Kewanee is a dramatic change from what I've dealt with and was used to. The staff actually speaks to you, their friendly and willing to help you succeed, your peers are willing to give you information and build you up for success.

I'm glad I made the first step for the Life Skills that I may need upon my release to society and grateful for the opportunities Kewanee has to offer with all the programs and classes that I can take. There's no excuses not to take advantage especially when your out from 5 am to 9:30 p.m. We only lockdown for counts and have the ability to make our own schedule.

it was Malaki was a servant and of service, never idle. Some us can say we are authors, have taken the time to learn both Spanish/Biblical Hebrew. I could go on how he spent his time positively and productively earning a Master Degree, Mentorship Certification, or the Accounting Diploma. However, my focus is on what Malaki has done since his release. Since his release Malaki has become the Career Readiness & Reentry Manager for Defy Ventures Illinois. Defy's mission and vision is to reduce recidivism through economic opportunity, and shift mindsets to change the narrative around those impacted by the legal system. This is what makes Malaki unique. Though, he was released he didn't have the mindset, that I'm free and putting prison behind me . Instead Malaki has been back inside several institutions to talk about the opportunities that are available. I remember him saying that so often we hear about the negative things, that many become hopeless and discouraged before they are released. Malaki, didn't spend his first summer (2023) out partying or frolicking around. Instead he was with Phalanx Family Services on the South Side of Chicago assisting with the massive givea-



ways all summer long. Also, he gave a helping hand to Touch Gift Foundation they provide food and clothing support to the homeless. All of this was done before reaching the one year mark of his release.

WTTW(PBS) did a documentary series Firsthand: Life After Prison. Chronicling the challenges and opportunities people face as they strive to restart their lives. At the end of the segment on Malaki he can be heard telling Warden Carothers of Kewanee L.S.R.C "I'LL BE BACK" watch and see. True to his word Malaki has been back. Being of service to his community in society and those of us still in custody. So, Malaki we SALUTE you for all you've done and continue to do. Mainly for showing what we can do upon our release when given a opportunity and when properly preparing ourselves. "WHEN OPPORTUNITY MEETS PREPARATION GREAT THINGS HAPPEN".

The second individual that I would like to pay homage to is Eric Anderson. Eric, was 15 years of age when he was arrested in 1995 for murder. Subsequently he was found guilty and sentence to life. Like many of us from Cook County who have experienced the Juvenile Detention Center, Cook County Jail, and Prison. Eric, was a product of those environments. Doing what he had to do to survive, however he did it with respect and integrity. Eric, has had an impact on all that crossed his path. (Future Leaders Apprenticeship Program)

Restore Justice life skills/non-profit advocacy/employment training program. "Who is wise? He that learns from everyone. Who is powerful? He that governs his passions. Who is rich? He that is content. Who is that? Nobody".

Last but not least, I would like to Salute one of our own here at Kewanee LSRC.

Elbert Conway (JR) and my self transferred to KLSRC on March 15th 2023. We arrived at



a time when the founders and vanguard of Kewanee Horizons were making their exit. With that in mind JR was highly invested in learning how things in the Media Room worked. He was dedicated to the point that he filled up an entire notebook or two taking notes. Learning from what became his predecessors and adding his own touch JR went from student to master within two months. Those, who look forward to and await the new issues of KH, if it wasn't for JR picking up the torch and running with it during a difficult period, the KH issues wouldn't have been as timely and put together. ONE CRAZY DAY

Sean, he's choking!" Those were the words my mother shrieked! Her hands flying to her face to smother a scream as we sat together on our first visit at the Pontiac Correctional Center's Medium Security Unit. That set in motion something extraordinary and life altering. Closing my eyes and recalling those few terrifying moments is much easier now as time has passed. But talk about a heart stopping moment. It took me a second to realize it wasn't my mother who was in pain due to the suddenness of her outburst, but the officer who was stationed behind us at the elevated podium desk where they monitor us from.

If we rewind the clock a bit, I'll give you some context as to how I ended up in the right place at the right time to save a man's life. I had recently been approved for medium security after spending 28 years in several different maximum security prisons as a consequence of receiving a mandatory life without parole sentence for a crime I committed as a juvenile. Due to the miraculous decision by a conservative leaning United States Supreme Court in 2012, of which Justice Kennedy was the deciding vote, Miller v Alabama outlawed the practice of mandatory death by incarceration for children. My best friend Brian and I set to work and researched every issue related to filing a successive post-conviction petition while applying a United States Supreme Court decision retroactively, before filing my own petition in the courts. It took some time navigating through a procedural nightmare but I was granted a new sentencing hearing. These types of hearings after so many years have gone by are excruciating for everyone involved and after a heartbreaking recitation of the crime, the Court sentenced me to 100 years in the Department of Corrections with the caveat that I was rehabilitated and not a danger to society. Several months later the court reduced it to 90 years at



50% (45 years in total to serve).

When I look back on it now, I vividly remember the Judge's softly spoken words—tinged with sadness and regret when delivering his decision—"it's a long time Mr. Helgesen, but you may get a chance to live some life outside of prison one day and to me that is not a life sentence." I was devastated. My soul felt like a pane of glass shattered into a million tiny shards reflecting back at me a lifetime of pain and the tragedy I was responsible for in so many lives. Not to mention the anguish associated with knowing that I was going to die in a cage alone like so many before me.

In the weeks ahead of me I spent much of my time in reflection and prayer. I was determined to be the man I professed to be even as I returned to prison—a decent man. No one can take that away from me. I resolved to turn the page and start a new chapter in my life without rancor, but with a purpose. I wasn't sure what that purpose was yet, but I couldn't accept dying in a prison cell. As a consequence of now having a term of year's sentence and IDOC's amended policy concerning how much time one can have before transferring to medium security, I was approved for the MSU.

Anyone who has spent significant time locked up in a maximum security prison understands the stages of decompression one experiences when moving to a lower level of security, I am no different. The adjustment was difficult but I clung to my family's hope and excitement for a future yet to unfold. Not long after moving to the MSU, my mother scheduled our first visit. This time though there would be no glass barrier between us unlike the 700 previous visits we shared together. My isolation was at an end and I was starting to feel human again.

If you haven't ate a double cheeseburger in decades, <u>it's absolutely amazing!</u> My mother and I were having a typical visit—we laughed and joke and generally have a good time because she's not just my mom, but a friend too. There were a few other families enjoying the moment, spending time with their loved one. On this particular day two officers were assigned to the visiting room. Just another typical day on the MSU until mother's scream tore through the room. Immediately my first concern was for my mom, but in short order I knew she was ok. I

then swung around in my chair and saw one Officer grabbing at his throat with desperation in his eye's. The officer's face was turning blue and he was dying right in front of us. His companion officer ran out of the room through a side door to get some help she later told me. As I scanned the room, I realized everyone else was in complete state of shock. No one moved. Against all my instincts, when it comes to dealing with Correctional staff, I leapt to my feet and within a step or two closed the gap between myself and the officer. I wrapped my arms around his chest and heaved him forward into the air. On the third attempt the obstruction cleared his throat and he was able to breathe again. Everyone in the room was visibly shaken but, my mind immediately went to, F\$%#! I just put my hands on someone! Luckily for me he was ok and the administration was quickly made aware that I was part of the solution and not the problem.

After a bit, the shock of it all slowly faded away and life went back to normal—prison normal. But, the reason why I wanted to share this story is that I have met so many people over the years (myself included) that have settled for and accept the reality that we've disappointed everyone we love and our communities at large. But I fervently believe it's within each and every one of us, when the moment arises to become *the hero of the moment* and break the mold of lowered expectations, do it!

Whether it be something small or something earth shattering, we can become what most believe is out of our reach; Redeemable! In the most humble of ways I know I can say this because right at this moment I'm at the Kewanee Life Skills Reentry center writing this feel good story to all of you when not so long ago the path I was walking in life was a brick road to nowhere. My heart goes out to all of you still struggling to find your path. But please, never stop looking!

GLOSSARY OF TRUCKING INDUSTRY TERMINOLOGY

Every career comes with its own unique set of acronyms and terminology that those new to the industry must learn, and trucking is no exception. In fact, the blend of high-tech equipment, regulatory oversight, and driver-to-driver communication in the trucking industry means there's an abundance of terms to learn—and getting the hang of the lingo can feel like navigating an entirely new language. Below are some of the most common terms used in trucking today.

In The Common Trucking Terms Not Found DL Study Guide:

Authority-Trucking carriers must obtain operating authority from the U.S. Department of Transportation to legally transport passengers or commodities.

Authorized Carrier-A shipper's pre-approved transportation provider. Many companies have lists of authorized carriers they work with.

Blind Spot-Blind spots are any areas around the truck that aren't visible to the driver through mirrors, windshields, or windows.

Carrier-A trucking company or owner operator that provides transportation services for shippers.

Cartage Company-A trucking carrier that provides local pickup and delivery services, often within one commercial area or town.

CEP-Courier, Express, and Parcel (CEP) refers to the services needed to deliver non-palletized goods via land, airways, and water. FedEx, UPS, and USPS are the main CEP delivery providers in the U.S.

Common Carrier-A trucking carrier that transports freight or people and works for any customer that pays the fee, as opposed to private carriers that work with one customer.

Company Driver-A driver hired as an employee to operate company-owned equipment. Com-



pany drivers are paid per mile, per hour, or via a flat rate.

Company-Sponsored Training-When trucking companies provide aspiring truck drivers with CDL training (usually free of charge or at a lower cost than other programs) in exchange for working for a pre-determined amount of time after earning their CDL.

CPM-Cents per mile (CPM) is the per-mile rate truck drivers earn for driving.

CSA (compliance, safety, accountability)-As the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Association's (FMCSA) safety and compliance program, CSA holds drivers and carriers responsible for safety on America's roads.

DAC Report-The Drive-a-Check (DAC) report is a file containing a truck driver's history, including CDL and endorsement information, employment history, traffic violations, types of freight hauled, drug test results, and driving performance records.

Dedicated Route-A dedicated route is when a truck driver travels the same daily route, usually with a predictable schedule, the same customers, and ample home time.

Detention-Sitting at a shipper or receiver waiting to get loaded/unloaded for more than an hour.

Dispatcher-A trucking carrier employee who acts as the main line of communication between truck drivers and the company.

Dock-Docks, located at warehouses, distribution centers, and terminals, are where trucks park to load and unload cargo.

DOT-Established by Congress in 1966, the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) sets transportation safety regulations.

Expediting-The process of shipping time-sensitive freight, often with pre-determined delivery dates and deadlines.

FMCSA-Part of the U.S. Department of Transportation, the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration regulates the trucking industry in the United States.

Forced Dispatch-When a carrier forces a driver to transport a load against their will by threatening various consequences, such as being fired or not getting consistent work.



IFTA-The International Fuel Tax Agreement (IFTA) is an agreement between the United States and Canada to distribute fuel taxes evenly. IFTA simplifies fuel use reporting for carriers that operate in more than one jurisdiction.

Interstate-Shipments that originate in one state and deliver to another.

Intrastate-Shipments that originate in and deliver to the same state.

Just-In-Time (JIT)-The shipping of goods to a customer just as they're needed to minimize inventory, reduce waste, and prevent delivery issues.

Layover-When a driver is on a delay for a day or more due to a shipper or receiver. Some drivers earn layover pay for these delays.

Lease Purchase Agreement-Similar to a standard lease, but with the option to purchase the equipment at the conclusion of the contract. Some carriers offer lease purchase agreements to owner operators looking to buy a truck.

Local Driver-A driver who operates in a small geographic area, usually within a 200-mile radius. Local truck drivers are home every night and generally work 8 to 10-hour days.

Logistics-The process of planning, coordinating, and executing the transportation of goods from one point to another.

Manifest-A shipping document that lists all freight and cargo items for a particular shipment. **MC Number-**Assigned by the FMCSA, the Motor Carrier (MC) number gives carriers authority to transport cargo and goods across state lines.

Medical Review Officer-A licensed physician certified to review lab results from drug tests, determine if positive results have a medical explanation, and report findings to employer representatives.

Motor Carrier-A motor carrier transports property or passengers for compensation.

MVR-A motor vehicle record (MVR) is a report including information on a driver's traffic violations, unpaid tickets, accidents, and driving convictions.

NAFTA-The North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) is a trilateral trade bloc between the U.S., Canada, and Mexico.



OOIDA-The Owner-Operator Independent Drivers Association (OOIDA) is the leading association for small business owner operators and professional truck drivers.

Operating Authority-Authorization granted by the FMCSA that allows trucking carriers to transport between states and across international borders. Carriers with operating authority have MC and DOT numbers.

OTR-Over-the-Road (OTR) refers to cross-country routes over long distances. OTR drivers can be away from home for weeks at a time, often driving more than 100,000 miles per year.

Owner Operator-A truck driver who owns and drives their truck and equipment, either operating under their own authority or leasing with a carrier.

Per Diem-A "per day" reimbursement for meals, overnight stays, and incidental expenses.

Port of Entry-Checkpoints at state or international borders where commercial drivers might have to stop and show paperwork.

Proof of Delivery-Proof of delivery (POD) is a receipt confirming that goods have been delivered.

Regional Driver-Drivers that haul freight within a specific part of the country (e.g., Midwest or Northeast). Regional drivers are usually able to get home weekly.

Relay-Drivers start at different points, meet in the middle, swap trailers, and turn around and head back to their home terminals. Relay driving enables drivers to be home every night and work with no touch freight.

Rider Policy-A trucking company policy that allows a non-employee to ride along with the truck driver.

Slip Seating-When drivers must clear their personal items from their tractor at the end of their shift to make way for another driver.

Team Driving-Two drivers switch off driving and sleeping and other non-driving tasks to expedite freight transport.

USDOT number-All companies operating commercial motor vehicles must have a USDOT number, a unique identifier that helps monitor a company's safety information.

VIN-The Vehicle Identification Number (VIN) is a unique number assigned to all vehicles and

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trailers.

Yard Jockey- driver who moves semi-trailers within a distribution center, factory, or cargo yard.

"A Prison Writers Guide to Media Writing is a multi-level journalism handbook for writers who are incarcerated. Over 200 pages, the handbook, by PJP co-founder Yukari Kane and Shaheen Pasha, includes instructional modules on 14 different types of journalistic stories: personal and reported essays, news, events, lifestyle and trends. Q&As, profiles and obituaries, local journalism, illustrated journalism and more.

Each module includes annotations to show what works well in a sample story and what kinds of changes an editor might suggest for improvement. There also are story prompts to help writers get started.

The handbook provides a style guide, guidelines for fact-checking and editing, and tips for communicating professionally with an editor. Readers will also find a risk assessment and other advice on how writers can look out for their emotional, legal and physical safety.



A Prison Writer's Guide to Media Writing "includes a correspondence course which allows writers to earn three PJP J-School certificates (Beginner Reporter, Intermediate Reporter and Advanced Reporter). Writers can expect standardized as well as personalized feedback from expert journalism educators on each assignment. Copies of the handbook will be mailed to participants at no cost and there is no cost to complete the training.

To begin the rollout of the handbook, PJP has chosen a cohort of 200 writers from across the U.S. to participate in the course beginning in early 2024. these participants have actively engaged with PJP and have shown that they are eager to deepen their journalism training.

THE MARKET CORNER: CANDLESTICKS



WELCOME TO **THE MARKET CORNER.** I would like to take you back in time (about 52 volumes ago) when there was this magical person explaining how **Candlestick Charts** worked. It is tried and true and I believe there is no reason to change the format. So, this article is resubmitted to you by **Robert "Bulldog" Kennedy**. Enjoy!

The Japanese introduced candlesticks back in the 17th century. Candlesticks were used as a form of technical indicator for rice market trading. Technical indicators are tools used to help try to predict price trends in the market. Today, candlesticks are used to evaluate the price action of stocks and commodities. Candlestick charts are very useful in trying to determine what direction a stock's price may be heading. A candlestick contains some very useful information about a stock's path for a certain period of time, anywhere from a few seconds to several years.

When we look at the body of a candlestick, it actually resembles a real candlestick but with two wicks attached instead of just one. The body of the candlestick represents the price action from the opening price of the stock to it's closing price. The two wicks, one on top of











the candlestick and the other on the bottom, show how high the stock's price rose for the day and how low the stock's price fell during the day's trading session. Usually, the candlestick's body will be green, or some other bright color or red or some other dark color. If the candlestick is green, it means the stock's price ended higher at the close than when it opened. On the other hand, if the candlestick is red, it means the stock's price ended lower at the close than when it opened.

Candlestick charts are good technical indicators of a stock's price movement over a certain period of time. It's a good way to track the past performance of a stock's price. Many analysts use these charts to try and determine the next possible direction of stock prices. While no one can ever know for absolute certain what direction a stock's price will move, many investors/traders do their very best to predict a stock's path.

This is what makes the market so fascinating! No one knows where the stock market will go next. It truly has a mind all it's own. When you invest in the stock market, you have an equal opportunity to obtain the American dream: wealth and prosperity, so stay invested!


