This population forecast reflects the Department's efforts to improve the method for projecting prison population utilizing a simulation tool that includes past experience and policy changes. Conceptually, the model is designed around the movement of individuals through the prison system. The data reflect Fiscal Year 2019 experience.

The underlying assumptions are:

1. Admissions are trending down but slowing in recent years
2. IDOC implementation of risk assessments to identify needs and target programs to reduce recidivism
3. High potential for legislative changes designed to shorten length of stay for certain offenses
4. Initial truth-in-sentencing offenders will begin to be released
5. Opening of Kewanee Life Skills Reentry Center for enhanced reintegration by offense class.
